

# Yellow group Keyworker Activities

## Mathematic colour hunt

Go around your household and talk to your child about what colours they can see. Ask your child to go and find something that is the colour you have asked for. They could then create their own rainbow on the floor with the objects they have collected. Alternatively they could sort a selection of objects into the colour groups.



## Literacy Name drop

Write on some paper the letters of your child's name and cut each letter out. Add a few more letters that are not in your child's first name. Put the letters in a tub or on a plate. If you have toilet roll holders ask your child to put the letters from their name into the tube. If not you could use bowls or plates and explain where you want the correct letters to go. At the end talk through the letters they have put in the tube and put the letters in the correct order, do this together first then ask your child to have a go independently.



## Lets get physical

Using different household objects set up an obstacle course for your child to complete.

You could use cushions for your child to jump from and also jump onto. You could use bottles or tins for your child to step or jump over landing on both feet.

Ask your child to balance putting one foot in front of the other and using their arms to balance. Put something visual down for the children to walk across. e.g paper or towels.



## Creating their own bear

We have been singing and taking part in lots of teddy bear activities. You could ask your child to create their own bear using objects around the house e.g a plate for a head, cushion for a body socks for legs etc. Use smaller ideas to create a face. Continue the fun by collecting some teddies and creating a nice teddy bears picnic for you and your child to have at home. Why not make the food for the teddy bears picnic together too!



## Listening and attention different room sounds

Start off by asking your child to name the different sounds that they can hear inside or outside the house. This activity can be extended by going round the house into each room (e.g in the kitchen you can hear a kettle sound or in the bathroom you can hear the tap dripping) ask your child to listen to different sounds ask them to name as many as they can. You could make it more interesting by creating different sounds for your child as you go. For example rustling crisp packets or jangling keys
