



Edible Broomsticks

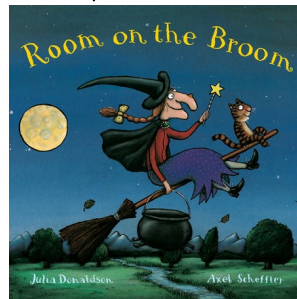
With your child you could make some edible broom sticks from food that you have around your house. You could use chocolate fingers or breadsticks for the broom stick and some cheese to make the end of the stick. Then you and your child could enjoy eating them together while you watch the story.
