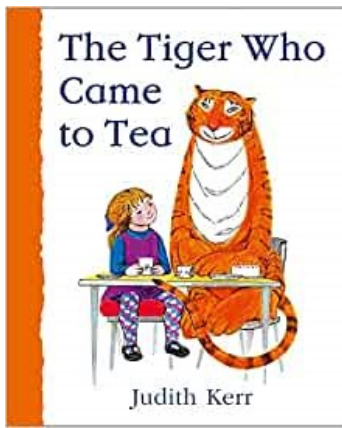


The Tiger Who Came to Tea Activities

Tiger Tea!

Why not host your own 'The Tiger Who Came to Tea' tea party? Can you remember what the tiger ate at Sophie's house?

- You could make invitations to give to your grownups, brothers or sisters.
- Ask a grown up to help you to make or set out all of the food that the tiger eats - Sandwiches, cakes, buns and biscuits.
- Use black and orange face paints (or makeup) to paint everyone's face like a tiger.

Tiger Mask!

Why not make your own tiger mask? - Talk about what a tiger looks like. What colour are they? What does a tiger need on their face?

What you need:

- A paper plate (or a circle of card).
- Orange and black felt pens, pencils or paints.
- Scissors.
- String.
- Tape.



What to do:

- Use the felt pens, pencils or paints to decorate your paper plate - making sure it's orange and black like a real tiger!
- Use the scissors to cut eye holes into the mask (A grown up may need to help with this).
- Attach string to the mask using tape to secure it around your head.

Tiger Dough!

Why not make some tiger coloured playdough? - Talk about how the mixture changes as you mix the ingredients together and cook it.

What you need:

- 1 cup of flour.
- 1/2 a cup of salt.
- 1 cup of water.
- 1 table spoon of oil.
- Orange paint or food colouring (about a table spoon).
- Collage resources - pipe cleaners, buttons, string, shredded paper, pasta, stones, sticks, googly eyes — Whatever you have!



What to do:

- Mix all of the ingredients together in a microwavable bowl.
- Place the bowl into the microwave for 2 minutes - stir and repeat until the mixture comes together into a ball and isn't sticky.
- Knead the mixture (Be careful it will be hot).
- Mould the playdough into the shape of a tiger. Talk about what the tiger needs - give him a face, stripes, etc.!
