I wonder what you will find!




Puddle steps over stepping stones, and whilst you might not have any stepping stones, you could make some!

Stepping stone ideas:

Cut out pieces of paper and write the numbers 1-20 on each piece. Place them in order and get your child to say each number as they step on each stone. Mix them up and get your child to hop onto each stone in the correct order counting to 20 as they go! You could turn this into a game of musical numbers, when the music stops, shout a number and your child has to step on the correct number stone.
